The Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception is the heart of our Diocese.

The TOGETHER vision is reflected in the buildings of the Cathedral campus, especially in the Cathedral church. The Cathedral represents who we are as Catholics: united as members of the mystical Body of Christ, the family of God, the community of believers, whether we live in the Cathedral parish itself, or in Bushton, Baxter Springs, Fort Scott, Zenda, and points in between.

The buildings of the Cathedral campus also embody what we do as Catholics: worshipping God at Holy Mass, and nourished there by word and sacrament, going forth to share in the mission of the Church, for example, learning the gospel and teaching it to others, offering service to people with material needs, and even offering ourselves – some of us – to serve as priests.

But the buildings that make up our Cathedral campus need our care. Outdated wiring, a leaking roof, deterioration and inadequate heating and air conditioning are just a few of the reasons for us to give back to our mother church, repairing and preserving the historic buildings that serve us.



Proposed Renovations

A \$16 million renovation will address safety concerns, energy efficiency and access for all members of the Diocese while enabling our Cathedral campus to better serve our diocesan family.

The new gathering space will house much-needed bathrooms, a bride's room, elevator access to the choir loft, additional storage and an energy efficient HVAC (heating, ventilation and air conditioning) system able to heat and cool the entire campus.

New elevators, ramps and entrances will invite individuals with all abilities to the Cathedral campus. The current gym will transform into a gracious social hall for parish and diocesan events. And a renovation of the old school building will help further the mission of the Church through the ministries of Catholic Charities, the diocesan Office of Hispanic Ministry and through the work of the Cathedral Parish.

St. Katharine Drexel Catholic School Fund \$10 million



Teach others to know God, so that knowing God, they will love God, and loving God they will serve God and others.



The St. Katharine Drexel Catholic School Fund presently distributes money to 23 financially-struggling parishes, so they can carry out the mission of Catholic education.

Each St. Drexel-supported parish has a significant number of families living at or below poverty level. They have active stewardship programs and dedicate more than half of their Sunday offerings to Catholic education.

The nearly 2,000 children attending St. Drexelsupported schools are learning faith and academics, respect and responsibility as they begin to understand the stewardship way of life.

The St. Drexel fund distributed more than \$300,000 to 23 parishes in 2008. If we raise an additional \$10 million through the TOGETHER vision, the fund will distribute more than \$700,000 each year.

Through the St. Katharine Drexel Catholic School Fund each parish can help children meet their spiritual and academic potential.

These are the children of the Catholic Diocese of Wichita, and each of us bears a share of responsibility for their formation.

St. Maria De Mattias Endowment \$1 million


The St. Maria De Mattias Endowment is a competitive grant program that supports Catholic parishes and organizations as they catechize and evangelize children and adults.

The St. De Mattias endowment is currently funding scholarships for 30 catechists earning their masters in theology at Newman University.

Previous grants also have provided curriculum and resource materials for use in Parish School of Religion and RCIA classes as well as funding religious educator positions in parishes.

Increasing the endowment by \$1 million would allow the St. De Mattias endowment to help more parishes develop Catholic formation programs and educate catechists as they teach others to know and love God.

God has blessed the Catholic Diocese of Wichita with many seminarians. And our diocesan family demonstrates gratitude by forming our young people in the faith, encouraging young men to discern God's call to be a priest, and funding the education of our seminarians.

For these young men, money is not - and should not be - a reason to keep them from entering the seminary nor should money introduce reluctance if a man feels called to step away.

With an influx of men pursuing a priestly vocation, it is sometimes a challenge to provide room, board and tuition for the seminarians of our Diocese who may give the rest of their lives in service to us.

Growing the endowment for the education of seminarians by an additional \$10 million will allow us to continue to educate the future leaders of our Church, providing freedom for them to discern God's call.

Ways of Giving

Gifts of Cash The most common method of making a gift is to contribute cash using either check, electronic fund transfer or a credit or debit card. You may benefit from such gifts with a charitable deduction on your tax return.


Securities Stocks, bonds or mutual fund shares that have appreciated can have an immediate impact on the TOGETHER vision and also create an income tax deduction for you based on their current value. Because there is no capital gains tax when you make a gift, you can double tax savings on shares you have held for more than a year.

Gifts of real estate Donations of appreciated homes, and other real property, are entitled to an income tax deduction equal to the full value of the property and no tax on capital gain. If debt-free property is donated, the gift is deductible at the property's appraised value. It may even be possible to make your gift of property now, but still maintain the right to use the property. By making this gift now, rather than in your will, you can realize an immediate income tax deduction.

Corporate-matching gifts A matching gift program provided through your employer or board membership may allow you to increase the value of your gift. Many companies match charitable gifts made by their employees, retirees or board members.

Deferred or planned gifts Planned giving is the process of carefully selecting the best method and asset for making a charitable gift. Such a gift can enable you to take full advantage of the tax laws to accomplish your financial and charitable goals.

Gifts of retirement plans Naming the TOGETHER vision as a primary or contingent beneficiary of a retirement plan (i.e. IRA, 401 (k)) can benefit both the Diocese and your estate. Your retirement account's plan administrator can help you designate TOGETHER as a beneficiary.


